## 1. A1600 Optical Transmission Platform

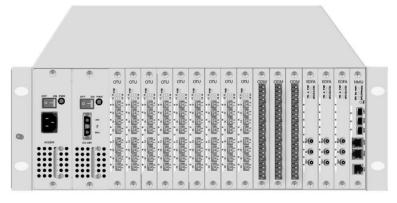
#### 1.1.1 Product Overview

A1600 1U, 2U and 4U platforms are highly integrated, compact in size. It features standard 19" 1U, 2U, 4U chassis, power supply (AC/DC optional), 1+1 backup, ready to install. 1U, 2U, and 4U transmission platforms support max 4, 8 and 16 services slots, mixed different interface modules (hot pluggable), in-band and out-of-band network management, flexible bandwidth per channel, remote update, easy maintenance.

### 1.1.2 Product Appearance and Size

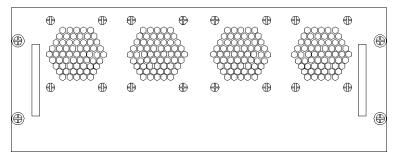
The 4U chassis has a standard length of 19 inches and a height of 4U, which is suitable for most standard cabinet installations. The main body of the chassis contains 16 card slots, including 15 service cards and 1 network management card unit. The network management card unit is installed in slot #16 by default (this slot is also available for service card when the network management card unit is not required). Support different service cards to mix and install (such as OTU wavelength conversion card unit, OEO relay amplification card unit, ETU photoelectric conversion card unit, OLP optical line protection card unit, OBP optical bypass protection card unit, OSS optical selective system card unit, ODM mux/demux card unit, OADM optical add/drop multiplex card unit, EDFA erbium-doped fiber amplifier card unit, DCM dispersion compensation card unit., etc.). There are also 2 power slots on the rear panel of the chassis, and all cards and power supplies are hot swappable. The dual power supply slots support AC and DC, and the specific configuration is optional according to customer requirements.

Chassis size: width \* height \* depth = 440 \* 177 \* 250mm.

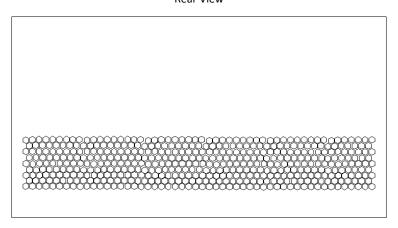


Front View





**Rear View** 

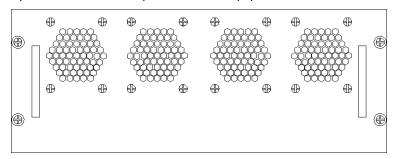


**Bottom view** 

### 1.1.3 Equipment Air Duct

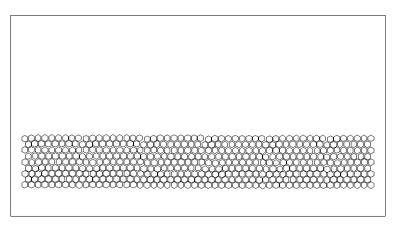
### 4U platform

The front and bottom sides of the chassis are heat dissipation channels, and the cooling fan is installed on the rear side of the chassis. The cold air is sucked in through the ventilation holes on the front of the bottom of the chassis and on the board panel, and is drawn out by the cooling fan on the rear panel. When installing the equipment, make sure that there is no obstruction in the range of 40mm on the front, rear and bottom vents of the chassis to ensure smooth airway and ensure smooth operation of the equipment.

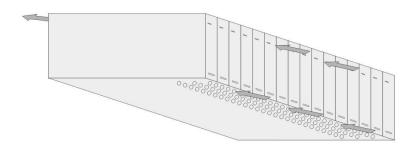


Rear Fan Illustration





**Bottom Air Inlet** 



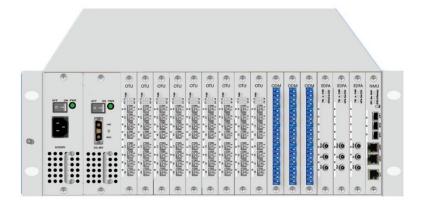
Heat Dissipation Diagram of Simulated Air Duct

## 1.2 Installation Preparation

### 1.2.1 Safety Matters

### 1.2.1.1 Universal Security

- Make sure that the floor of the installation site is dry and level, and that you are ready to do so.
- Keep the equipment clean and free of dust. Do not place the device in a damp place.
- When handling equipment, please take care to avoid the body being scratched by sharp parts of the equipment.

### 1.2.1.2 Electrical Safety

- Carefully check the work area for potential hazards such as ungrounded power, unreliable power grounding, and wet ground.
- Before installation, please know the location of the emergency power switch in the room where the equipment is located. When an accident occurs, first turn off the emergency power switch.
- Always unplug all external cables (including the power cord) before moving the device.
- When performing live maintenance, it is recommended that two or more people be on site.
- When turning off the power, please make sure that the zero line of the equipment has been disconnected, be sure to check and confirm.

#### 1.2.1.3 Static Electricity Safety

To prevent static electricity from damaging the electronics of the device, antistatic measures are required.

- If you need to install or replace various parts of the equipment, especially when there are components of the circuit board (such as a single board), you must wear an anti-static wrist.
- When taking the board, take the edge of the board and avoid touching components and printed circuits.

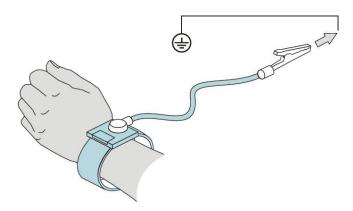


• For your safety, check the resistance of your ESD wrist. The resistance between the human body and the earth should be between 1 and 10 megohms.

### > The steps to use the antistatic wrist are as follows:

- Step 1: Put your hand into the anti-static wrist cover.
- Step 2: Tighten the lock to confirm that the metal piece on the anti-static wrist has good contact with the skin.
- Step 3: Clamp the alligator clip of the ESD-preventive wrist strap to the grounding post of the device.
- Step 4: Confirm that the ESD wrist strap is well grounded.

### > How to use the ESD wrist strap refer to the below picture.



### 1.2.1.4 Handling Safety

- Unplug all external cables (including the power cord) before handling or moving the device.
- If the distance is too long, it is recommended to use professional mechanical handling tools.

#### 1.2.1.5 Laser Safety

For transceiver modules and passive devices with optical interfaces, avoid looking directly at the laser beam emitted from the inside.

 Directly looking at the laser beam from inside the optical interface can cause damage to your eyes.



#### 1.2.2 Environmental Inspection

#### 1.2.2.1 Checking the Condition of the Machine Room

### **Check temperature and humidity**

- In order to ensure the normal operation and service life of the equipment, a certain temperature and humidity must be maintained in the machine room. The ambient humidity of the machine room should be controlled at 5 to 95% (non-condensing).
- If the relative humidity is too large, it may cause poor insulation or even leakage of the insulating material, and corrosion of metal parts may occur.
- If the relative humidity is too low, it is easy to generate static electricity and the loosening of the fastening screws caused by the shrinkage of the insulating gasket.
- The ambient temperature of the equipment room should be controlled between 0 and 40 °C.
- Excessive ambient temperatures accelerate the aging process of components and insulation.
- If the ambient temperature is too low, the system may be unstable.

### Check cleanliness / ventilation

Dust is a major hazard to the safety of the equipment. Indoor dust falling on the body will cause
electrostatic adsorption, which will cause poor contact between metal inserts or metal
contacts, which will not only affect the life of the equipment, but also cause communication
failure. Therefore, the environment to be placed must be kept clean and it is forbidden to place
the equipment in a dusty environment such as renovation. In addition, make sure that there is
at least 4 cm of space at the air inlet and outlet of the equipment, and maintain good
ventilation to facilitate heat dissipation of the chassis.

#### Check the power supply conditions

- A good power supply system is the basis for the power-on and stable operation of the
  equipment. This equipment is rack-mounted. The power supply has been configured at the
  factory. Users only need to check that the power supply system of the installation site can meet
  the requirements.
- Check whether the power supply facilities in the machine room are complete and whether the power meets the equipment requirements.
- Check whether the power supply of the machine room is consistent with the equipment requirements, and the voltage is consistent.
- Make sure the power supply system in the machine room is stable.
- When using an electrical outlet to provide the nearest AC power to the equipment, be sure to
  use a power outlet with a grounded protective connector and ensure that the grounding
  protection point of the power supply is securely connected in the building.

#### **Check grounding conditions**

• Confirm that the machine room, cabinet or workbench have good grounding conditions.



#### **Check electromagnetic environmental conditions**

The device may encounter various interference sources during operation, which may adversely affect the normal operation of the device. In order to enhance the anti-jamming and lightning protection capabilities of the equipment, the following suggestions are made:

- Keep away from high-power radios, radar launchers, and high-frequency, high-current devices.
- The equipment application environment needs to have a level of lightning protection measures.
- The power supply system should be used as much as possible and take effective measures to prevent grid interference.
- Ensure that the power supply of the equipment is well grounded or that it is added to the lightning protection device.

#### **Checking equipment**

- Check if the installation space and the handling space are sufficient.
- This equipment can be placed directly on a clean, flat workbench. Please ensure the stability of the workbench and good ventilation.
- When the device is installed in the cabinet, in addition to maintaining a good ventilation and
  cooling system for the cabinet, it is also required to be strong enough to support the weight of
  the device. In addition, ensure that the installation cabinet has good grounding conditions.

### 1.2.2.2 Tools and Instruments that May be Used

#### 1.2.3 Unpacking and Inspection

After confirming the safety items and the installation environment meets the requirements, you can unpack, inspect goods and confirm that the equipment and accessories are correct and complete.

#### 1.2.3.1 Unpacking the Device

The equipment is first sealed with a transparent plastic bag (internal desiccant, mainly waterproof), then the pearl cotton (protection equipment) is placed on both sides, and then put into the packaging carton, and the relevant accessories are put in, and then sealed. Finally, the carton is placed in a transparent plastic bag, sealed, and packaged with a baler.



#### The equipment unpacking steps are as follows:

**Step 1:** Confirm that the box is placed face up with the front side facing down through the up arrow  $(\uparrow \uparrow)$  mark on the side of the box.

**Step 2:** Check the packing list on the side of the box to confirm that the equipment specifications and model are correct.

**Step 3:** First cut the strap on the box with a paper cutter and then remove the clear plastic bag from the box.

**Step 4:** Use a paper cutter to cut the sealing tape at the top and side edges of the top of the box. Be careful not to insert it too deeply to avoid scratching the contents of the box.

**Step 5:** Open the package, take out the accessories, take out the equipment together with the pearl cotton, remove the pearl cotton and the plastic bag on the equipment, and then take out the equipment. Equipment should be placed on a clean, level surface to avoid contamination and scratching equipment.

#### 1.2.3.2 Equipment Inspection

Take out the "Packing List" in the accessories in the box, check whether the equipment is correct and the accessories are complete according to the items listed in the list.

#### Note:

- 1. Please keep the accessories in the box safe to prevent loss.
- 2. Please keep the original equipment packaging materials as much as possible in case you need to return them.

### 1.3 Equipment Installation

The equipment is designed according to the installation requirements of the standard 19-inch cabinet. The height is 4U. It can be directly installed on the working platform or installed in a 19-inch standard cabinet. The following two installation methods are described separately.

### 1.3.1 Equipment is Installed in the Cabinet

The height of the device is 4U, and the length is designed according to the standard 19-inch cabinet. Occupies the height of the cabinet is 4U (about 177mm).

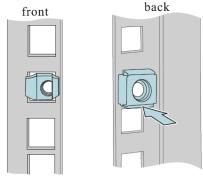
#### Precautions before installation:

- Wear an antistatic wrist strap.
- Check the grounding and stability of the cabinet and confirm that there are no obstacles affecting the installation of the equipment inside and around the cabinet.
- Confirm that the cabinet has good ventilation and heat dissipation.
- Make sure that the chassis lug screw is locked, otherwise use a cross screwdriver to tighten it clockwise.
- When installing multiple devices into the cabinet, keep a certain distance between the devices as much as possible to facilitate heat dissipation.

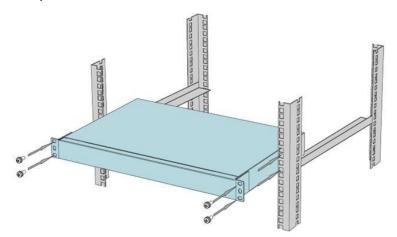


### **Installation steps**

1. Determine the location where the device should be installed in the cabinet, compare the mounting holes of the mounting ears, and determine the position where the nut on the square hole of the cabinet should be installed.



- 2. Install the nuts to the appropriate locations as indicated.
- 3. Under the marked mark, install a tray or rail to hold the device before reinforce lugs and square bars. (If you cannot find auxiliary tools such as trays or rails in the machine room, you may need to hold the equipment until the screws are reinforced.)
- 4. 4. Push the device from the front of the cabinet along the tray or rail slowly into the cabinet. Align the mounting holes of the mounting bracket with the previously installed nuts, and then lock the two screws with the matching screws. If necessary, the tray or rail can be removed, leaving enough space for the device to dissipate heat, and it is also convenient to use it to continue to install subsequent devices.





When loading the device, it should be handled as lightly as possible to avoid scratching the device. Make sure that the chassis mounting ears are securely fastened to the cabinet.



#### 1.3.2 Equipment Installed to the Workbench

#### **Precautions and installation steps:**

- 1. Wear an antistatic wrist strap.
- 2. Make sure the workbench is clean, stable, secure, and has good ventilation, power and grounding conditions.
- 3. Check the grounding and smoothness of the workbench and confirm that there are no obstacles around the installation.
- 4. The vents of the 4U equipment are on the left and right sides of the chassis. Therefore, ensure that there is no obstruction near the vents of the equipment to ensure that the ventilation passages are unobstructed.
- 5. Place the unit face up and place it on the work surface.



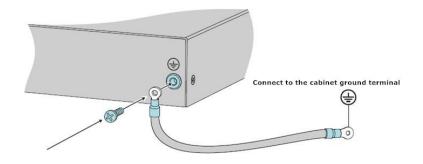
Do not place heavy objects on the device.

### 1.3.3 Equipment Grounding

A grounding screw (printed with a grounding mark ) is attached to the rear panel of the device, and it is connected to the grounding bar on the cabinet or workbench with a grounding wire.

#### Grounding wire installation steps:

- 1. Remove the two lugs and one grounding wire from the equipment accessories and use a wire stripper to peel the skin at both ends of the grounding wire by about 1 cm. Then, the stripped head is inserted into the crimping hole of the lug, and then the crimping forceps are used to crimp the two together. In the same way, crimp the two ends of the ground wire.
- Unscrew the grounding screw on the back of the unit, thread it through the ear hole of the
  grounding wire, and then screw the screw into the original grounding hole and tighten. Connect
  the other end of the ground wire to the grounding point on the cabinet or workbench in the same
  way.

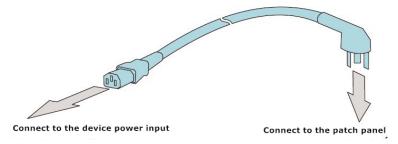




#### 1.3.4 Connecting the Power Cord

#### Connect the AC power cord

Plug one end of the AC power cord (one end with three pin-shaped holes) into the AC power outlet on the rear panel of the device and the other end (with one end of the two or three pin-shaped pins) into the socket of the external power supply system.



### **Connect DC power cable**

The DC power cord is three-color three-core (blue, brown, and yellow-green). The connection method is: brown is connected to the positive pole (GND), blue is connected to the negative pole (-48V), and yellow-green is connected to the protective ground. When connecting, strip the 6-core tail cladding at both ends of the DC power cable to expose the metal wire to a length of about 4 cm. According to the label on the power cord, find the corresponding chassis power connector (each connector has a corresponding printed logo), loosen the screw of the power connector; then wrap the end of the stripped end on the loose screw. Make sure that the two are in good contact, and then tighten the screws with a cross screwdriver to make the two firmly contact. The other end of three cores are used to connect the power supply of the machine room or cabinet. Before connecting, you need to measure the power supply voltage with a multimeter, confirm the positive and negative poles and the protection ground, and connect them after confirming no any errors.

#### Note:

- 1. Before connecting the power cord, make sure the switch on the power supply is "OFF".
- 2. Verify that the connected power supply voltage meets the requirements.

#### 1.3.5 Post-installation Check

The inspection after installation is very important, because the installation is firm or not, the grounding is good or not, and the power supply is matched or not, which is directly related to the normal operation of the equipment. Therefore, after the equipment is installed, you should pay attention to the following items:

- 1. Check if there is enough space for heat dissipation around the equipment, and whether the installation workbench or the installation cabinet is stable.
- 2. Check that the ground wire connection is secure.
- 3. Check that the power cord is securely connected and the power supply is matched to the power required by the device.



## 1.4 Device Plugging

### 1.4.1 Plug and Unplug the Card

Under normal circumstances, when the device is received, all the cards have been correctly installed in the front panel of the chassis. If you need to install the card, replace the card, or adjust the card slot, you need to insert and remove the card.

#### Pull out the card:

- 1. Use a cross screwdriver to turn the captive screws on the upper and lower ends of the card counterclockwise.
- 2. Loosen the screw by hand until it is completely clear of the chassis panel.
- 3. Holding the two captive screws on the upper and lower ends of the board panel at the same time, pull out the card slowly and pull it out.

#### Insert the card:

- 1. Locate the slot where you want to insert the card, and then align the upper and lower edges of the card with the guide rails on the upper and lower edges of the slot. Pinch the captive screws of the card with both hands and push the card slowly into the chassis along the guide rails until the card is properly connected to the chassis backplane.
- 2. Tighten the captive screws on the top of the card panel clockwise and then use a cross screwdriver to reinforce.

#### Note:

- 1. Do not use excessive force when pulling out the card. If it is difficult to pull out, please confirm whether the screw is completely loose, and if there is any abnormality, the card is stuck.
- 2. Insert the card slowly. Do not use brute force. If the insertion is difficult, check if the socket pin is bent, deformed or broken, and the guide rail is deformed.
- 3. Try to avoid plugging and unplugging the card during normal working of the chassis.
- 4. Try to avoid inserting and removing the card when it has an external connection.

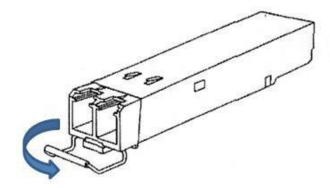
#### 1.4.2 Plugging and Unplugging Transceiver Modules

Under normal circumstances, when the device is received, all transceiver modules have been correctly inserted into the card as required. If you need to insert, replace, or adjust the transceiver module slot, you need to insert and remove the transceiver module.

#### Pull out the transceiver module:



- 1. Pull the tab of the head of the transceiver module (as shown above).
- 2. Hook the tab with your finger and pull the transceiver module out in parallel.

#### Insert the transceiver module:

- 1. Locate the slot where you need to insert the transceiver module.
- 2. Insert the transceiver module along the shield in parallel and slowly until the transceiver module is in good contact with the card.

#### Note:

- 1. Do not reverse the direction when inserting the transceiver module.
- 2. Do not use excessive force when plugging or unplugging the transceiver module. If it is difficult to insert or remove, check if there is any foreign object blocking in the shield.
- 3. Insert the transceiver module slowly. Do not use brute force. If the insertion is difficult, check whether the socket pin is bent, deformed or broken, and the guide rail is deformed.
- 4. Try to avoid plugging and unplugging transceiver modules with optical fibers inserted.
- 5. Do not touch the gold finger of the transceiver module with your fingers during the process of plugging and unplugging the transceiver module.
- 6. Wear a dust cap when the transceiver module is not in use.
- 7. During the process of plugging and unplugging the transceiver module, if the transceiver module is powered on, you should avoid the eyes from looking directly at the transceiver module to avoid eye damage.

### 1.4.3 Plug and Unplug the Power Supply

Under normal circumstances, when the device is received, all power supplies have been correctly inserted into the back of the chassis as required. If the power supply needs to be replaced, then you need to plug and unplug the power supply.



#### Unplug the power:

- 1. Use a cross screwdriver to loosen the captive screws on both sides of the power box panel counterclockwise.
- 2. Hold the chassis with one hand and pull the handle on the power box with one hand, and slowly pull the power box out of the chassis.

#### Plug in the power:

- 1. Along the power rail on the back of the chassis, slowly push in the power supply until it is in good contact with the backplane.
- 2. Turn the captive screws at the four corners of the power box panel clockwise and then use a flatblade screwdriver to reinforce them.

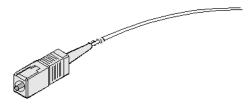
#### Note:

- 1. Before plugging and unplugging the power supply, make sure that the power cord is not connected and confirm that the chassis power is off.
- 2. Insert the power supply slowly. Do not use brute force. If the insertion is difficult, check if the socket pin is bent, deformed or broken, and the guide rail is deformed.

### 1.4.4 Plugging and Unplugging Optical Jumpers

The optical jumpers used to connect the cards in this device mainly have three types of connectors: SC, LC, and FC.

#### For the optical jumper of the SC head (large square):



When inserting the optical jumper:

Carefully align the fiber head with the optical interface on the optical interface board (the bump on the fiber head is aligned with the corresponding notch of the adapter), push it in with a moderate force, and hear a click. Indicates that it is inserted in place.

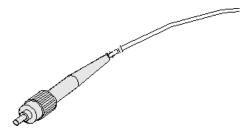

• When pulling out the optical jumper:

Press the connector first, push the fiber plug inward, and then pull out the plug.



### For the jumper (round head) of the FC head:



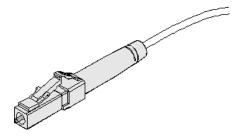
• When inserting the optical jumper:

Carefully align the fiber head with the optical interface on the optical interface board (the bump on the fiber head is aligned with the corresponding notch of the adapter), push it in with a moderate force, and then rotate the outer ring screw sleeve clockwise. , tighten the optical connector.

• When pulling out the optical jumper:

Firstly, rotate the outer ring screw sleeve of the fiber interface counterclockwise. When the screw is loose, pull out the fiber slightly.

### For the jumper of the LC head (small square head):



When inserting the optical jumper:

Carefully align the fiber head with the optical interface on the optical interface board, and push it in with a moderate force. When you hear a click, the spring bounces to indicate that it has been inserted.

• When pulling out the optical jumper:

Press the tab first, and then pull out the plug.

#### Note:

- 1. Wear a dust cap when the optical jumper or the corresponding adapter is not in use.
- 2. When plugging and unplugging the optical jumper, you must straighten in and out. Do not use brute force.
- 3. Clean the ceramic end face of the jumper with a clean paper before inserting the optical jumper.

#### 1.5 Power on the Device

#### 1.5.1 Check before Power-on

1. Check that the power cord is connected properly.



- 2. Check that the ground wire is connected properly.
- 3. Check that the card and module are correctly inserted.

#### 1.5.2 Power on the Device

1. Turn on the chassis power switch.

The device is usually equipped with dual power supplies (single power supply can also provide the voltage required for the whole machine). By default, dual power supplies are turned on.

#### 1.5.3 Check after Power-on

- 1. When the chassis power switch is turned on, the corresponding power panel indicator lights up.
- 2. The chassis fan starts to work: blow out (with a fan sound and feel it).
- 3. After all cards have been loaded, all card power indicators will illuminate.
- 4. Check that the air inlet of the chassis is clear.



If the device fails to power on after the above steps, please contact the supplier.

### 1.6 Equipment Testing and Connection

#### 1.6.1 Connecting the Network Management System

For the connection method, refer to the NetRiver User Manual and the Web User Manual.

#### 1.6.2 Card Testing and Connection

According to the requirements of the scheme design, test the parameter index of each port to see if the scheme design requirements are met. Then, according to the design scheme, use the corresponding optical jumper or network cable to connect each port between the cards. After confirming, that the input/output indicators of the port are within the design requirements, and the interfaces between all the cards and the external lines can be connected in turn.

#### Note:

- 1. When installing the equipment, the staff wears an anti-static bracelet, and the ground of the bracelet should be connected to the ground of the cabinet.
- 2. When using the optical power meter to test the input optical power value of the port, do not let the optical power exceed the overload power of the port to avoid light saturation and damage the device.

The optical port must be cleaned before connecting the fiber. After removing the fiber, the ceramic core must be covered with a dust cap to avoid contamination.



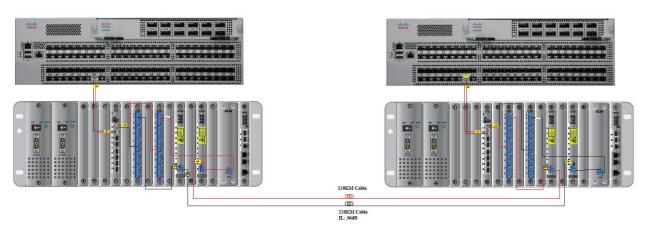
The connection between devices should be neat, compact and organized.

The optical jumper should be as straight as possible and turn to a large bend (diameter > 5cm) to avoid the impact of small bends on insertion loss or breaking the fiber.

### 1.7 Equipment Running

All the above steps and operations, tests, and connection confirmation are correct, that is, the device is normally running.

#### Notes:

#### 1. The sensitivity of the optical module.

Line site: The receiving sensitivity range of the 10G-80KM-C36 module is -7 dBm to +23 dBm, and the Rx power is recommended to be greater than -20 dBm to have a certain redundancy.

**Client site:** The receiving sensitivity range of the 10G-80KM-1310nm module is +0.5 dBm to -14 dBm, and the Rx power is recommended to be greater than -10 dBm to have a certain redundancy.

#### 2. EDFA (BA) power amplifier (20/G20).

You can set the input to -5 dBm and the output to +15 dBm via the VOA function.

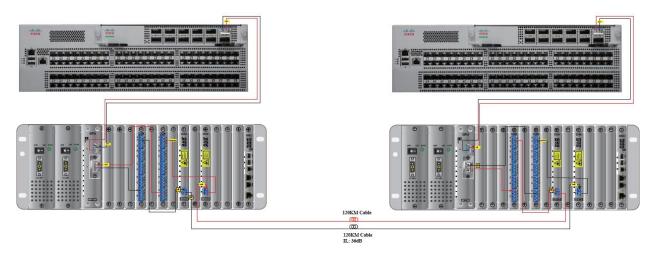

#### **Notes:**

#### 1. The sensitivity of the optical module.

**Line site:** The receiving sensitivity range of the 100G-coherent optical-C33 module (tunable wavelength) is -24 dBm to +5 dBm, and the Rx power is recommended to be greater than -20 dBm to have a certain redundancy.

Client site: The total receiving sensitivity range of the 100G-10KM-1310nm module is -6 dBm to +10.5 dBm, and the Rx power is recommended to be greater than -5 dBm. The receiving sensitivity range of single lane channel is  $\geq$ -10.5 dBm, it is recommended that single lane channel receiving sensitivity is  $\geq$ -8 dBm to have a certain redundancy.

#### 2. EDFA (BA) power amplifier (20/G20).

You can set the input to -5 dBm and the output to +15 dBm via the VOA function.

#### 3. EDFA (PA) preamplifier (17/G25)

The test predicts that the input (IN) needs to be greater than -21 dBm, and the output is +4 dBm.

4. Adjust the light attenuation by adding a fixed attenuator.

#### 1.8 Precautions

- 1. Before testing, you must have a certain understanding of the wavelength of the measured light and the amount of optical power. Choose a wavelength that is similar or consistent. Do not allow the input optical power to exceed the range that each module or device can accept. Excessive optical power can damage the device.
- 2. Make sure that the equipment is powered when the equipment is well grounded. Make sure the input supply voltage is within the voltage requirements of the device. In the case of an indeterminate voltage range, the multimeter's maximum range position test can be used to confirm and re-access.



- 3. If there is a sudden disturbance in the host, the host should be shut down and then deal with it.
- 4. The optical connection port must be connected and accurately positioned. Otherwise, the optical power attenuation will become large, and the transmission distance and power test value of the optical signal will be incorrect.
- 5. Be sure to keep the input and output pigtail end faces clean, especially if the output end faces are dirty, it is easy to make the output power of the output pigtail end face become smaller, and the transmission equipment cannot be guaranteed to work normally.

#### **Equipment maintenance:**

- Reasonable installation, use and proper storage of equipment can maintain good performance indicators for a long time and prolong their service life, so proper maintenance is required.
- Equipment should avoid strong mechanical vibrations, collisions, drops and other mechanical damage. Good packaging and vibration, rain and waterproof measures must be taken during transportation.
- The equipment should be kept clean and the working environment should be free of corrosive gases such as acid and alkali. Gently scrub the chassis and panel with a clean towel dampened with water or soapy water. Do not scrub with solvents such as alcohol.
- The layout of the pigtails should be reasonable and it is forbidden to be placed in a position that is easily squeezed and pulled. A sleeve is required to protect the pigtails if necessary.
- Wear the dust cap in time to remove the fiber optic cable to prevent hard objects, dust, contamination and damage to the end face of the connector.



## 2. 100G CFP Coherent Transponder



The CFP 100G transponder is a 100G service access module designed by for optical fiber links. It can realize the wavelength tunable of CFP coherent transceiver module, and can be converted into DWDM standard wavelength optical signal, cooperates with DWDM multiplexer/demultiplexer to realize wavelength division multiplexing transmission. It provides a high-quality solution for solving transmission lines with insufficient fiber resources and high fiber line loss.

#### 2.1 Board Introduction

- 1. The board supports hot-swap, and can be plugged into any slot on the front panel of the 1U/2U/4U/5U chassis.
- 2. The OTU board has two slots, QSFP28 (supporting rate 100 Gbps) and CFP (supporting rate 100 Gbps).
- 3. The board panel has 3 indicators.
- 4. The indicator is used to indicate the running status of the board.
- 5. Two modules L and C form a unidirectional or bidirectional, where L represents the line side (plugin CFP coherent optical module), C represents the client side (plugin single-mode or multi-mode

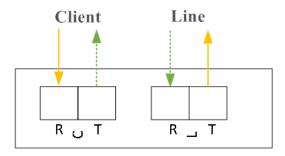
## 2.4 Description of Common Transmission Types

#### 1) Dual fiber bidirectional (client single mode or multimode)

L and C form a channel bidirectional link. The local client signal (single-mode or multi-mode) is input from the C/R port. After OTU conversion (the client signal wavelength is converted to the wavelength of the wavelength division module), the L/T port sends out. the opposite site signal is input from L/R port, after OTU conversion (the line site signal wavelength is converted to the wavelength of the client module), then sent out from the C/T port. (as

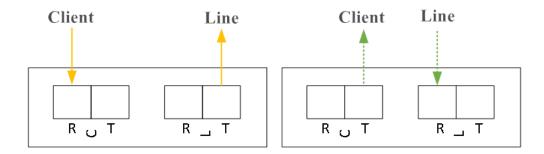


shown in the below figure, the solid line and the dashed line respectively represent a group of signals, and the optical path directions of the central office and the end are the same.)



### 2) Single fiber unidirectional (client single mode or multimode)

L and C form a unidirectional link, The local client signal (single-mode or multi-mode) is input from the C/R port, and after OTU conversion (the client signal wavelength is converted to the wavelength of the wavelength division module), it is sent out from the L/T port. (as shown in the below figure, the left picture shows the direction of the light path at the central office, and the right picture shows the direction of the end light path)



### 2.5 Board Connection Method

Transponder is usually used in WDM system and is used in conjunction with passive multiplexing and demultiplexing units. ## 3. 2.5G and 10G Transponder



Ascent's 2.5G & 10G Transponder is mainly used for wavelength conversion. Firstly, the G.957 compliant multiplexed optical path signals are converted into optical/electrical (O/E), and then the converted electrical signals are shaped, regularly extracted, and regenerated (ie 3R), or no regeneration (ie 2R), and finally electrical/optical (E/O) conversion. The output wavelength, dispersion, and luminous power all meet the CWDM/DWDM multiplexed optical path signals required by the G.692 specification.

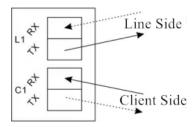

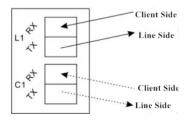

Take the first group of L1/C1 as an example: The local client signal (Single-mode or multi-mode) is input from the C1/RX port, after the Transponder conversion (Converts the client signal wavelength to the wavelength corresponding to the wavelength division module.), and output from the L1/TX port; the opposite end signal is input from the L1/RX port, and after Transponder conversion (Converts the line side signal wavelength to the wavelength corresponding to the client module.), and output from the C1/TX port. L2/C2, L3/C3, L4/C4 groups have the same optical path direction. (As shown in the figure, the solid line and the dashed line respectively represent a group of signals, and the local and end optical path directions are the same.).

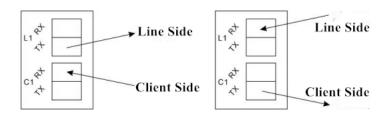

The optical paths of C1, L2, C2, L3, C3, L4 and C4 groups are the same. (As shown in the figure, the solid line and the dashed line respectively represent a group of signals. The picture shows the direction of the optical path at the public end. Usually, there is a demultiplexing device directly connected to the client device without Transponder board conversion.).





### 3.4.3 Single fiber unidirectional (Client multimode)

L1/C1, L2/C2, L3/C3, L4/C4 form one unidirectional group. Take the first group of L1/C1 as an example: The local client multi-mode signal is input from the C1/RX port and converted by Transponder (The client signal wavelength is converted to the wavelength corresponding to the wavelength division module) and then sent out from the L1/TX port. The optical light paths of the L2/C2, L3/C3, and L4/C4 groups are the same. (As shown, the left picture shows the direction of the local optical light path, and the right picture shows the direction of the end optical light path.).



### 3.5 Board Connection Method

Transponder is usually used in WDM system and is used in conjunction with passive multiplexing and demultiplexing units. The TX/RX port of the client module is connected to the RX/TX port of the client device, and the line site TX/RX port connects to the multiplexer/demultiplexer port of the passive device(the channel must be matched).

## 4. Fixed Dispersion Compensation Module (DCM)

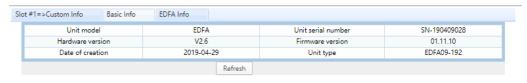

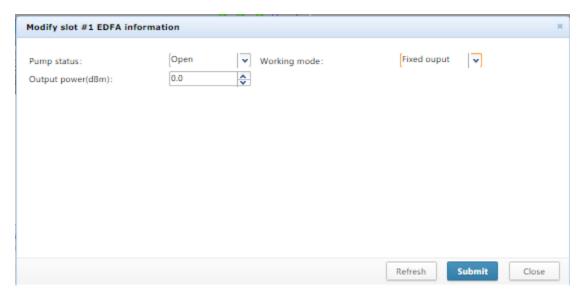

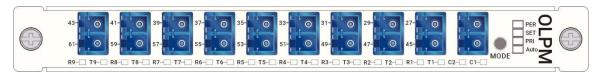

### Optical Line Protection Module Card(OLPM)

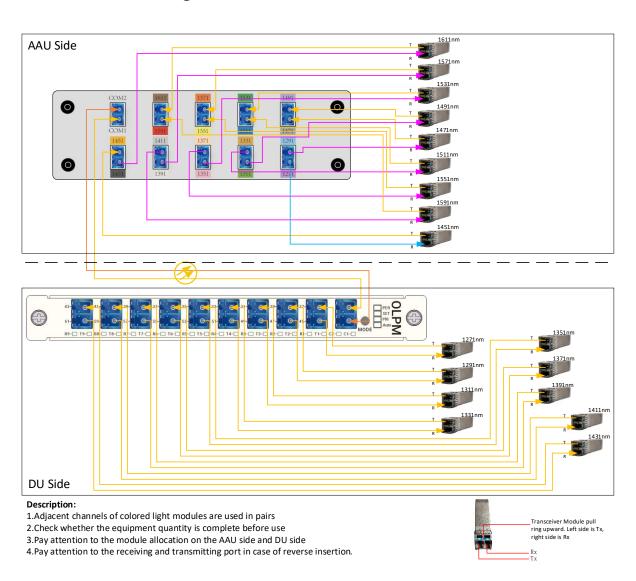

After the optical signal from the AAU site is split by a 50:50 coupler, it is simultaneously transmitted to the DU site through the active and standby links. At the receiving end, based on the power of the two signals



received, the receiver of the DU site selects to receive one channel signal. At the same time, the optical signal emitted by the DU will also be transmitted to the AAU through the optical path selected by the receiver.

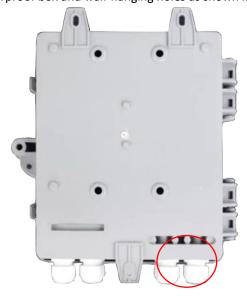
### 8.2 Installation Steps

### 8.2.1 Wall mounting

Step 1: Install the waterproof tail sleeve at the entrance and exit of the optical fiber, as shown in below picture.



Step 2: Determine the wall of the installation, the back of the fiber optic waterproof box close to the wall, and then through the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure front of the three wall-hanging holes, mark the wall, the back of the waterproof box and wall-hanging holes as shown in below picture.





Step 3: Use a drill to drill holes for the identified wall hole markings, and tap the expansion plugs into the punched holes.





Step 4: Put the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure close to the wall and align its wall mounting holes with the screw holes on the wall, then use a Phillips screwdriver to screw the Phillips self-tapping screws into the expansion plug holes in order to fix the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure to the wall.



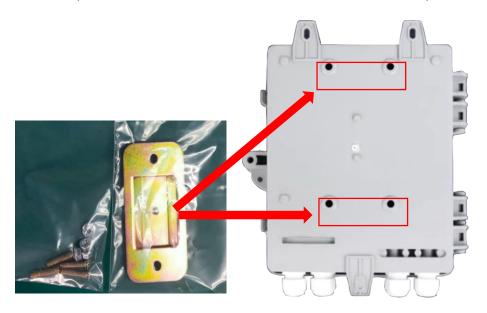
### 8.2.2 Pole mounting

Step 1: Install the waterproof tail sleeve at the entrance and exit of the optical fiber, as shown in below picture.





Step 2: Put the front side of the metal patch shown in Figure 9 against the back side of the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure, and make the holes of the small iron piece and the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure aligned with the holes of the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure. Then put the screws through the holes on the back of the metal patch, and then use the nut to lock the screws inside the Fiber Optic Enclosure.



Step 3: Loosen the fastening screws of the metal ring and pull out one end of the metal ring, then pass the metal ring through the fixing groove of the small metal iron piece in the way shown in below picture.





Step 4: Place the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure onto the pole to be fixed, and then lock the metal ring, as shown in below picture.



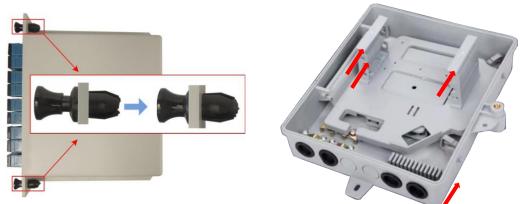


### 8.2.3 Installation of cassettes

Step 1: Insert the insert cassette passively into the slot inside the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure in the direction of the arrow, as shown in below picture.



Step 2: Slowly press the top and bottom 4 pull pins down so that the pull pins snap into the jacks of the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure, as shown in below picture.



Step 3: The need to access to the insert box passive optical patch fiber from the fiber optic inlet (signal in) and fiber optic outlet (signal out) through, as shown in below picture.





Step 4: Connect the LC optical jumper fibers to the passive ports of the patch boxes to be docked, as shown in below picture.



Step 5: Close and lock the lid of the waterproof Fiber Optic Enclosure.

### 8.2.4 Fiber connection and disconnection

The passive interface of the cartridge is usually the LC interface (SC or FC interface can also be used as required),

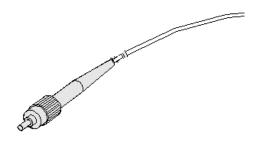
#### (1) For SC head optical jumper (large square head):



Insert the optical jumper, you should carefully align the fiber optic head on the optical interface board on the optical interface (fiber head of the bumps aligned with the corresponding notch adapter), moderate force into the push, hear the "click" sound, said to have been inserted into place.

When pulling out the optical patch cord, you should first press down the snap-on connector, push the fiber plug inward slightly, and then pull out the plug outward.

### (2) For FC head optical jumper (round head):

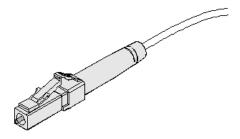




When inserting the optical jumper, you should carefully align the fiber head with the optical interface on the optical interface board (the bumps on the fiber head are aligned with the corresponding notches on the adapter), push in with moderate force, and then rotate the outer ring of the screw sleeve clockwise to tighten the optical connector.

When pulling out the optical jumper, first turn the outer ring of the fiber optic connector counterclockwise, and when the screw is loosened, pull out the fiber optic with a little force.

#### (3) For optical jumper of LC head (small square head):



Insert the optical jumper, should be carefully aligned with the optical fiber head on the optical interface board optical interface, moderate force pushed into the "click" sound, the shrapnel pop-up, said to have been inserted into place.

To unplug the optical patch cord, press down on the tabs and then pull out the plug.

#### Caution

- 1. Wear a dust cap when the optical patch cable or the corresponding adapter is not in use.
- 2. Do not use brute force when inserting or removing optical patch cords.
- When the end face of the fiber optic head is in contact with other objects, clean the ceramic end face of the jumper with dust-free paper before inserting the optical jumper.

- (4) Check the optical module corresponding to the channel of each node optical power, confirm the optical power in which the node began to deteriorate, available fiber optic cleaning pen on the node fiber end face cleaning.
- (5) Check whether the light emitted by the optical module at the opposite end is weak, and use the fiber optic cleaning pen to clean the end surface of the optical module or replace the optical module.

# 9. OADM/ODM Optical Add-Drop Multiplexer/Demultiplexer



ODM Optical Add-Drop Multiplexer/Demultiplexer is a CWDM/DWDM multiplexer/demultiplexer. It can mux and demux CWDM/DWDM channels, greatly save customers' optical fiber resources, and flexibly change network configuration according to customers' requirements. The 100Ghz DWDM system supports smooth upgrade to 48 channels, and the 50GHz DWDM system supports smooth upgrade to 96 channels. Higher spectrum utilization, saving bandwidth resources. Moreover, the CWDM system supports a smooth upgrade to 18 channels.

### 9.1 Board Introduction

1. The board supports hot-swap, and can be plugged into any slot on the front panel of the 4U chassis or 1U chassis.



- 2. The board is divided into two types according to the provided interfaces, occupying one slot in the chassis.
- 3. All interfaces are LC/UPC or LC/APC. A single slot board supports up to 20 LC optical port outputs.
